## 1 *From Federal Minister for Multicultural Affairs*

### ➤ **New multicultural access and equity plans unveiled**

Commonwealth government departments and agencies are tailoring their services for people from culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) backgrounds under new multicultural access and equity requirements.

On 31 July 2013, the Minister for Multicultural Affairs, Senator Kate Lundy, unveiled new multicultural access and equity plans from government departments and agencies. The plans outline the strategies, priority actions and targets for improving services for individuals from CALD backgrounds.

'Government programs and services should be accessible by all Australians and responsive to their needs regardless of their cultural and linguistic backgrounds,' Senator Lundy said.

In 2011-12, an independent panel asked how the Australian government could improve the responsiveness of its services to the culturally and linguistically diverse population of Australia.

The government issued its response to the panel's findings and recommendations in early 2013, outlining its commitments against each recommendation under the strengthened Multicultural Access and Equity Policy: Respecting diversity. Improving responsiveness.

Under the policy, all Australian government departments and agencies are required to prepare biennial agency multicultural plans.

'The plans clearly define minimum obligations that must be addressed across six sections: leadership, engagement, performance, capability, responsiveness and openness. Each section outlines priority actions, responsibilities, timelines and measurable targets.

### ➤ **AFL star helps build a resilient community**

On 01 August 2013, Attorney-General Mark Dreyfus QC and Minister for Multicultural Affairs, Senator Kate Lundy, announced a grant of \$156 000 to the Australian Football League to extend the Bachar Houli Cup and Leadership Program for another year.

'The Bachar Houli Program embraces Australia's diversity and builds greater social cohesion through sport,' Mr Dreyfus said.

'The Federal Government is proud to support successful projects such as this, which enable communities to challenge ideologies that can lead to mistrust and marginalisation.'

Senator Lundy said, 'Australia is a vibrant and successful multicultural nation because national sporting organisations, like the AFL, have embraced the benefits of our diversity.'

'Bachar has been an impressive role model through his educative role at the AFL, inspiring young Muslims to become more involved in sport and the wider community.'

The Bachar Houli Program provides an opportunity for students from Islamic schools to play in an AFL 9s competition, culminating in the Bachar Houli Cup.

In addition, the program provides mentoring, education and leadership sessions.

Based on its success, the program has recently been shortlisted for the prestigious international Beyond Sport Award.

AFL Head of Diversity, Jason Mifsud, thanked the Australian Government for its support of the Bachar Houli Program.

'We are really proud of the pivotal role Bachar is playing as a Multicultural Ambassador in breaking down social barriers and uniting multicultural communities through AFL,' Mifsud said.

'Currently, the Bachar Houli Program engages 30 Islamic colleges nationally and more than 5000 participants annually. It plays an integral role in fostering greater cultural understanding and promoting social inclusion.'

#### ➤ **Community Proposal Pilot – announcement of approved proposing organisations**

The Department of Immigration and Citizenship has appointed four well-established community organisations to participate in the community proposal pilot announced by the former Minister for Immigration and Citizenship on 31 May 2013.

The community proposal pilot is a program being trialled by the Australian Government to provide a mechanism for communities within Australia to identify and support individuals in humanitarian situations offshore for entry into Australia. It provides for 500 places within the 20 000 place humanitarian program.

The Liverpool Migrant Resource Centre and Illawarra Multicultural Services in New South Wales joined by AMES and the Brotherhood of St Laurence in Victoria have entered into a deed of agreement with the department as approved proposing organisations.

Approved proposing organisations will be responsible for proposing people for a refugee and humanitarian visa and, if their application is successful, help them to settle in Australia.

It allows people to report their employment income in Arabic, Chinese, Vietnamese and English.

It's simple and user-friendly, and a huge step forward in providing more accessible services to our multicultural customers.

There's no longer a need for customers to visit our service centres or wait on the phone to report their employment income.

The in-language Express Plus Lite mobile app is available free to download from the App Store and available for iPhone, iPod touch and iPad.

To use the app, people need to:

- be registered for Centrelink Online Services (access level 3), and
- own an iPhone, iPad or iPod touch.

The Federation of Ethnic Communities' Councils of Australia (FECCA) is proud to announce the release of a new series of factsheets, developed in conjunction with industry experts and professionals, aimed at fostering greater awareness and appreciation of cultural diversity in Australian workplaces.

The factsheets were formally launched by Senator the Hon Kate Lundy, Minister for Multicultural Affairs, at an event hosted by the Australian Government Department of Immigration and Citizenship (DIAC) in Dandenong, Victoria, on Monday, 29 July 2013.

The series of factsheets are the culmination of a year-long project undertaken by FECCA, called Harmony in the Workplace: Delivering the Diversity Dividend, funded and supported by DIAC's Diversity and Social Cohesion Program.

Comprised of a series of ten factsheets in total, the resources cover a diverse range of issues, from exploring cultural diversity in the context of Australia's broader workforce, to legal frameworks concerning workplace discrimination. They also discuss myths and commonly held misperceptions about cultural diversity in the workplace, as well as tips on maximising cultural diversity for the benefit of organisations and their employees.

### 5 From Office of Multicultural Affairs and Citizenship (OMAC)

#### ➤ **Multicultural Festivals and Events Grants**

Applications for Round 2, Multicultural Festivals and Events Grants 2013-14 are now open. Applications can be made for events between 1 January 2014 and 30 June 2014 including activities in Cultural Diversity Week 2014.

Multicultural Festival and Events Grants are designed to encourage the participation of the whole Victorian community in celebrating and valuing diversity.

#### **Eligibility**

- Only incorporated organisations and associations with 20 or more members should apply.
- Other organisations must be auspiced or can be partners. Schools can apply for Cultural Diversity Week events.

#### **Important Information**

- Events must be held between 1 January and 30 June 2014.
- The average grant is \$1,600 – most grants range between \$500 and \$2,000.
- Events must be held in Victoria.
- Applications must be received by the VMC by 5pm on 20 September 2013.

Detailed eligibility requirements are provided during the application process.

#### ➤ **Hamer Scholarship Program now open**

Applications are now open for the Victorian Government's Hamer Scholarship Program.

The program includes intensive language study and cultural immersion for approximately one semester - five to six months. Live and study in China, Indonesia, Japan or Korea and improve language skills and cultural understanding; develop business and people-to-people networks; and contribute to Victoria's international engagement.

With two applications rounds per year, the scholarship details for each country are:

China - 50 scholarships per year at \$10,000 each

Indonesia - 50 scholarships per year at \$10,000 each

Japan - 30 scholarships per year at \$15,000 each

Korea - 30 scholarships per year at \$15,000 each

Applications close on 22 September 2013.

### 6 *From Ethnic Communities' Council of Victoria (ECCV)*

#### ➤ **Palliative Care project launch**

On Tuesday 06 August 2013, The Minister for Health and Ageing, the Hon. David Davis, launched the Culturally Responsive Palliative Care Community Education Project in an all-day event in Melbourne.

The project is a partnership between the Ethnic Communities Council of Victoria, Palliative Care Victoria and the Multicultural Centre for Women's Health.

The launch gathered over 50 people from representatives from the participating communities, Chinese, Italian, Maltese, Vietnamese and Turkish; to age care bodies, palliative care service providers and holistic service providers

ECCV Deputy Chairperson Marion Lau OAM presented at the launch and explained the importance of this project.

"People from Non-English Backgrounds need to be informed of the palliative care services available to them and how to access them but for that to happen we also need to make those services more culturally inclusive and responsive."

Research shows that individuals from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds have lower rates of utilisation of palliative care services.

As a project partner ECCV will be responsible for the roll out and to ensure that representatives from the 5 communities are involved and service providers receive tailored information during upcoming peer education sessions that will be delivered across local communities in South East, East, West and Northern Metropolitan Melbourne.

### ➤ Award for Muslim and non – Muslim Understanding

This award is part of the International Centre for Muslim and non-Muslim Understanding and aims to work towards improving relations between those who are Muslims and those who are not and is a means of celebrating those members of the community who have done the most to improve understanding between Muslims and non-Muslims in Australia.

You can nominate an Australian citizen or permanent resident of any or no religious affiliation, or an organisation based in Australia.

Winners will be announced in December 2013 at the University of South Australia.

Nominations close on 20 September 2013.
