## 1 From Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP)

### ➤ Machinery of Government changes

A new government was sworn in on 18 September 2013 and there have been some changes around the administration of settlement services and multicultural affairs. The Governor-General has signed new Administrative Arrangements Orders (AAOs) formalising a move for multicultural affairs and settlement services into the Social Services portfolio. The Hon Kevin Andrews MP is now the senior Minister for Social Services. Minister Andrews is supported by Senator the Hon Concetta Fierravanti-Wells as Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Social Services with special responsibility for Settlement and Multicultural Affairs.

### ➤ Real Estate Agencies Pilot

The Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) has expanded the Real Estate Agencies Pilot, delivered through the Translating and Interpreting Service (TIS National), to include more areas of new settlement. The expanded Pilot will run until 30 June 2015.

An evaluation of the extended real estate agencies pilot, which ran from October 2011 until 30 June 2013, determined that it was effectively meeting its objective of assisting newly arrived humanitarian entrants and permanent residents to independently navigate the private residential property market.

Any licenced real estate agency that operates in one of the eligible areas of new settlement can now self-register with TIS National for free telephone interpreting services. Eligible areas of new settlement are found in all capital cities, major regional cities and some rural areas where newly arrived permanent residents and particularly humanitarian entrants are settling. ### 2 ***From Federation of Ethnic Communities' Councils of Australia (FECCA)***

#### ➤ **FECCA Disability Survey 2013**

People with disability, and especially those from culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) backgrounds, may experience exclusion from aspects of society such as mainstream services, social opportunities and wider participation in civil society.

The implementation of DisabilityCare shows that policy makers agree with the increasingly popular opinion that such exclusion is unacceptable in a modern society, and that people with disability deserve the same opportunities as everyone else.

Community and not-for-profit organisations are a key part of civil society – and a part of society that is historically progressive. As DisabilityCare starts to roll out, FECCA is looking into the involvement of CALD people with disability in community and not-for-profit organisations.

FECCA have developed a short survey to try to obtain some information about whether or not, and how, CALD people with disability are engaged with such organisations. It only takes a few minutes to complete.

FECCA hopes that by collecting information about where and in what capacity CALD people with disability are involved in community and not-for-profit organisations, they will start to be able to identify what works and what doesn't work, and make some suggestions to drive positive change.

The results will also assist FECCA to ensure that disability advocacy priorities are consistent with the needs of our constituents.

### 3 ***From Ethnic Communities' Council of Victoria (ECCV)***

#### ➤ **ECCV – SBS – Deakin Media Mentoring Program promoting diversity in the media**

Five first year Arts students from ethnic backgrounds are about to embark on a Media Mentoring Program, developed by ECCV, to pursue a career where culturally diverse faces are still a minority.

The Media Mentoring Program launched in 2012 by ECCV in partnership with SBS and Deakin University aims to increase multicultural diversity within the Australian media.

ECCV Deputy Chairperson Eddie Micallef, hopes the program will lead to more culturally diverse faces in the media.

“I am confident the program will continue to open the way to a more inclusive and diverse media, that reflects an increasingly multicultural Australia,” said Mr Micallef.

The program is intended to support mentees during their studies, assist them to develop their career plans, equip them with hands-on skills, provide networking opportunities and facilitate pathways to media careers.

It was designed by ECCV in response to concerns about the negative media portrayal of multicultural communities in the mainstream media in 2010-2011 and to facilitate access for people from non-English speaking backgrounds and refugees to a career in media.

“ECCV has a keen interest in fostering partnerships at local and state level that will make it easier for young people from a migrant and refugee background to succeed and this program is a prime example of that,” said Mr Micallef.

After a successful first year that saw students carrying out their Arts-based degree at Deakin, SBS mentors will take the students through the National Ethnic and Multicultural Broadcasters’ Council Youth Conference before completing an SBS internship in 2014.

#### 4 *From Donate Life*

##### ➤ **The greatest gift**

Have you talked with your family about organ donation? It’s an important conversation to have. One organ and tissue donor can transform the lives of 10 or more people and, on average, 1,600 Australians are on transplant waiting lists at any one time.

Most religions support organ and tissue donation as an act of giving that preserves the sanctity of life. People from all walks of life depend on organ and tissue donation to save their lives or improve the quality of their lives, regardless of race, origin, religion or language.

Many Australians have concerns about whether their culture or religion is supportive of organ and tissue donation.

The Organ and Tissue Authority has produced some resources to help you make this important decision. The resources were developed through consultation with religious

and cultural leaders, for people of Jewish, Hindu, Greek Orthodox, Buddhist, Islamic and Catholic faith. They are available in different languages including: Vietnamese, Chinese (traditional), Greek, Italian, Spanish, Arabic, Turkish and English.

#### **➤ Learning and Professional Development Courses**

A key focus for Foundation House is the provision of professional development to support individuals and organisations in community, education and health services working with people from a refugee background.

The professional development aims to help these organisations and practitioners respond to the unique needs of survivors of organised violence. All professional

development is facilitated by practitioners working with torture and trauma survivors ensuring their knowledge and experience is current and relevant.

This two day workshop provides an approach to working with refugee survivors in a range of settings. It will include presentations, experiential exercises, role plays and discussions in large and small groups.

- Develop basic counselling skills for handling difficult and distressing situations
- Reflect on their own responses, emotional challenges and learn how to use this self knowledge

Suitable for those working with people of refugee background in positions where counselling is an incidental part of the role e.g in settlement, youth work, housing, employment, welfare, health and community services.
